## INDEX OF GLENDALE'S 1940 BLACK HOUSEHOLDS

One of the ingredients that went into making Glendale the vibrant, peaceful and enjoyable community it was for 100 or more years was the hardworking, cooperative and caring black families that lived there. The men worked at the mill, some in the warehouses, on the cotton platform, in the boiler room, as floor sweepers, in the sanitation department, as plumbers, truck drivers, at least two were mill store drayage boys while others worked in maintenance in and out of the mill. Some men being brick masons and carpenters, worked for homeowners outside the village. Henry Patton, who worked in the mill as a sweeper was also a brick mason. He underpinned this writer's house while his son, James Patton dug out a basement for me.

Many of the black ladies cooked for mill overseer families and for families where both parents worked. Some baby sat and cared for the sick when needed. Aunt Ella Dillard, as she was known and loved by all, was a self-taught practical nurse and had hardly any time off from caring for the sick in their homes. A good number of the black ladies did washing and ironing. Entire families would oft time work in cotton and corn fields after work at harvest time. When a chore needed to be done, someone was always available to help when needed. A wonderful relationship existed between the whites and the blacks, each caring for and helping the other.

A few lived in the village while most lived on the outskirts in company owned farm houses. A few owned their own homes while others rented or lived in farm tenant houses. During the forties, my dad built and rented three houses to the blacks. The three room house rented for 75 cents a week while the four room house rented for 1 dollar per week. We never had a turnover or trouble with the renters. All the men worked at the mill.

Remembering well the contributions the blacks made to the life of the Community and for Glendale History, I have tried to put together an index of the black family households. While this writer knew many if not most of the families, I have used the 1940 Census to jog my memory and help me make sure that as many as possible are indexed. Some names are almost illegible in the census but I have tried to use all care possible in transposing the information. Where I have failed, I apologize.
